Continue your immersion journey in te reo Māori and lead the way for your whānau, hapū and iwi.

Function confidently in most situations using only te reo Māori. Learn to articulate your ideas and hold meaningful dialogues using metaphors and whakaaro Māori.

Develop a translation skillset, and learn in an encouraging environment that also challenges you to speak and think in the reo.

<p>Ngā Āhuatanga o te Reo At the end of this kōnae ako (modules), taura (students) will be able to apply correct use of grammar using a variety of sentence structures in the form of a range of passive, stative, actor emphatics, negative and possessive patterns to demonstrate an accurate understanding of the meaning of those texts.</p>	15
<p>Whakamāori/Whakapākehā At the end of this kōnae ako, taura will be able to evaluate selected texts and produce an accurate translation from English to Māori and Māori to English, including informal and formal language.</p>	15
<p>Te Orokohanga o te Ao At the end of this kōnae ako, taura will be able to rangahau, discuss and present various versions of the creation stories.</p>	15
<p>Kupu Whakanikoniko At the end of this kōnae ako, taura will be able to identify, accurately interpret and use metaphorical language.</p>	15
<p>Te Whakawhitinga o Ngā Waka At the end of this kōnae ako, taura will be able to explain the reason behind the migration to Aotearoa and identify key people and their roles and responsibilities on board. Taura will also align their pepeha to the journey of their waka.</p>	15
<p>Take Whenua At the end of this kōnae ako, taura will be able to rangahau and articulate the significance of a selected iwi landmark. Taura will articulate the roles and responsibilities of key people responsible for the land and provide an inventory of the landmarks natural resources.</p>	15
<p>Aroā At the end of this kōnae ako, taura will be able to provide an accurate summary through comprehensively examining and interpreting meanings from selected texts.</p>	15
<p>Waiata/Haka At the end of this kōnae ako, taura will be able to rangahau and present key features of a waiata and haka composition that is both inherited and contemporary.</p>	15

Entry Criteria

To enrol in this programme, a potential taura must be:

- › be at least 16 years of age
 - › be a New Zealand citizen (or citizen of Australia, Tokelau, Niue, Cook Islands) or permanent resident
 - › have successfully completed our Te Rōnakitanga ki te Reo Kairangi/Te Hapūtanga o te Reo Level 5, or a te reo Māori diploma qualification at Level 5, or Year One of a te reo Māori degree (Rumaki)
 - › attend an interview or information hui with a kaiako.
- or**
- › successfully complete the pre-entry assessment (PEA) – direct entries only
 - › attend an interview or information hui with a kaiako.

- › New Zealand Diploma in Te Reo (Rumaki) Level 6

Potential Careers & Pathways

I want to keep studying

Increase your expertise with our higher level qualification, the Diploma in Te Pīnakitanga ki te Reo Kairangi Level 7.

I want to use my qualification

With skills at this level you could be a kaiako in a kōhanga reo or kura. You could also provide cultural advice in your workplace or organisation, or take on leadership roles in your marae, hapū or iwi.

Delivery & Workload

This is a full-time programme that consists of 120 credits delivered over 40 weeks. Some of our locations offer different delivery modes. These will be confirmed by your local campus and might include:

Option 1

- › weekly wānanga (10 hours per week)
- › 3 x 1-day wānanga (8 hours per wānanga)

Activity directed learning will also need to be completed outside of class time amounting to approximately 24.5 hours per week.

Option 2

- › 1 x weekly wānanga (3 hours)
- › 8 x noho marae (26 hours per noho)

Activity directed learning will also need to be completed outside of class time, amounting to approximately 24.5 hours per week.

Some of the learning activities will need to be completed online. You'll need to have access to an internet connected device to complete some learning activities.
